- O About Tri-County Humane Society:
 - O Founded in 1974
 - 5,264 animals received in 2023
 - O 2023 placement rate 94%
 - ~30 staff members
 - 16,627 volunteer hours 2023
 - O 3,204 surgeries in 2023



Outdoor Cat Management Strategies


- From a shelter perspective
- Not one right way to help
 - Some options better than others
- Available resources
- Data-driven practices that align with ethical standards
- Consideration of community values
- O How does outdoor cat management practices fit in with other programming?

Complexity of Outdoor Cats

Feral ~ Tomcat ~ Kittens Stray ~ Kittens ~ Birds Lost ~ Found ~ Alley Cat Unowned ~ Pest ~ Feral Community Cat ~ Pregnant


For today's purposes:

- Community cat
 - Unowned
 - Lack socialization to humans
 - Age past socialization period
 - Accustomed to outdoor life
 - Generally healthy
 - Best option generally TNR/RTF



I found a cat...

- Is the cat friendly?
- Does the cat appear sick and/or injured? Severity?
- How long has the cat been around the area?
 - A day
 - A week
 - A year



I found a friendly cat...

- If healthy, make every attempt to find an owner
- Cats are 10-50 times more likely to make their way back home if left in the same area they were found (2)
- If no owners are found after several attempts, proceed with stray hold and adoption pathway
- If sick or injured, contact local shelter, rescue, or veterinarian for care (while still looking for an owner)



FOUND cat in the alley between the 1000 block of Riverside Dr SE and Killian Blvd in St. Cloud. Young adult, maybe one year old, female, domestic mediumhair, tortoiseshell pattern. Very social with people and affectionate. If this is your cat or you know who may be missing it, message me. I'll work with the local humane society to scan her and move forward if no owner is found by tomorrow. Thanks!





I found an unsocial community cat...

- How long has it been around?
- Significantly injured or ill?
- Healthy and robust?
- Pregnant?
- Consider options before taking action



Who cares?

- Citizens
- Municipalities
- Public health officials
- Animal shelters & rescues
- Animal control agencies
- Cat advocates
- Neighbors
- Wildlife advocates










Common goal – LESS OUTDOOR CATS

What to do with them all?


- O Removal
 - Euthanize or cull
 - O Relocation
 - O Attempt to socialize
- O Leave in their outdoor home
 - O Do nothing
 - O Provide basic care
 - O Sterilize, vaccinate, etc.
 - O Humane, effective




Why not just remove them?

- Trapping and removal does not affect population size
 - One example: 44% of cats removed from semi-isolated peninsula, population rebounded to same starting size in 3 months (1)
- The reason a cat lives in that outdoor area remains
 - O Human-created environment
- Remove a cat and resources open up for a new cat
- Remaining cats continue to reproduce & population rebounds
- Vacuum effect

Community Cat Sterilization

- O TNR
 - Trap, Neuter, Return
- O TNVR
 - O Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate, Return
- O TNRM
 - O Trap, Neuter, Return, Monitor
- O RTF/RTH
 - O Return to Field/Home
- O SNR
 - O Spay, Neuter, Return



Targeted, Intense Approach

- Focus on each colony with purpose
- Aim for 75% or higher (4)
- O Sporadic TNR less effective for overall population decline
 - Still beneficial

Empirical evidence of results (3)

- O Chicago: 54-82% reduction in colony populations
- Newburyport, Massachusetts: 100% reduction in 17 years
- Australia: 31% reduction (small colony size)
- University of Central Florida: 85% reduction over 11 year period
- Texas A & M University: 35% reduction of cats

Not one right way - Core


- O Trap
- Spay/Neuter
- O Rabies vaccine
- O Recovery period
- O Return





TCHS RTF Program

- Individuals identify community cats
- Inform about RTF program
- O Collect cat inventory
- Determine best route for cat(s)
- Triage-approach
- Schedule surrenders for adoptable cats or surgeries for unsocial community cats



What about the kittens?! (At TCHS)



- All kittens under 5-6 weeks old should remain with nursing mother if stable
- When possible, work on socialization during that time
- Once on the cusp of weaning, (5-6 weeks old), intake kittens for adoption pathway
- Keep more cats from growing up to be community cats
- Don't forget about mom!

Trap

- Large humane live traps made for cats
- No feeding the cats for at least 24 hours
- Set around dusk or at typical feeding time
- O Monitor closely for success
- Secure cats



Surgery Day

- O Morning check in
 - O Explain the veterinary care to client
 - O Ear-tip
 - O Post-op restriction
 - O Release



Procedures



- O Spay/neuter & tattoo
- O Rabies
- O Distemper combo
- O Left ear tip & tattoo
- +/- other treatments as needed



What about Feline Leukemia or FIV?!

- Not testing RTF cats
- O 2020 American Association for Feline Practitioners retrovirus management guidelines
- Spay/neuter is contingent on an outwardly healthy appearance
- If they happened to be positive, the virus is already present in the colony
- O Retroviruses are less likely to spread after cats are spayed and neutered

Recovery

- Confinement overnight at minimum in a secure location
- Trap with newspaper or pad
- Medium lined plastic crate
- Wet food
- O +/- small litter box
- Visual assessment prior to release
- Release at optimal time




When Return is not an Option

- Working Cat Adoption Program
 - O Acclimation period
 - O Can be a struggle to find homes
- Lengthy confinement of feral or asocial cats is not always humane
- O Health of cat



Cat Welfare Concerns

- "Outdoor living is rough"
 - O Without denying some hardships, not evidence that outdoor cats are significantly less healthy than indoor counterparts <1% of cats admitted to TNR clinics requiring euthanasia due to health (1)
- "Can't survive the winter"
 - Then why are there so many?
- "Risk for suffering"
 - All cats have risks, indoor or outdoor
- "Every cat deserves an indoor home"
 - Every cat deserves a good life



Human Benefits

- Smells like tomcat
- Noise from cat fights and mating
- Public health
 - Waste in yard or garden parasites, unsanitary conditions
 - Rabies concern
- Trauma from witnessing hunting or remains
- Stresses out owned cats

ALL DRASTICALLY REDUCED WHEN CATS HAVE BEEN STERILIZED AND THE POPULATION DECREASES!

Wildlife & Birds

- Fewer cats = fewer hunters
- Once altered, less roaming
- If there is a reliable source of shelter and food for the cat (care takers in the area), there may less need to hunt
- O Not "either or"
- O Human activity

Manage the environment to keep cats away!

- O Ultrasonic deterrents
- Motion-activated sprinklers
- Repair/close gaps in decks, foundation, out buildings
- No access to trash or potential food sources
- Fencing
- O Dog
- Garden stakes
- Chicken wire
- O Guards for bird feeders, strategic placement



Key Points of TCHS Program

- Remove friendly cats for adoption (when/where feasible)
- Remove kittens ASAP for adoption
- O Focus on an entire colony
- O Educate, collaborate
- O Work within your resources
- One step at a time
