The Last Note From Vicki As Executive Director

Vicki Davis is retiring in early February 2024; Marit Ortega will succeed her as Tri-County Humane Society's Executive Director.

I've been working through a long list of "lasts," and now it's time to write my last newsletter letter. Dramatic pause ...

I can't deny this comes with a mixture of emotions – nostalgia, pride, and some sadness, just to name a few. Stories upon stories attached to each one of those. Kate has plans for the other 11 pages, so I need to keep it brief.

I've had the best job ever - most of the time - and the times it wasn't served as an excellent incentive to do something about it. What an incredible journey it has been serving this organization. I'm immensely grateful for the support and passion that each one of you has brought to TCHS. I'm so proud of the progress we've made together. Your commitment to our mission has enabled us to achieve significant milestones, from our humble beginnings in a renovated gas station to having our own surgical team to spay/neuter every dog, cat, and rabbit, as well as be able to fix whatever else might be ailing them. I'm quite certain eyes roll when I start a sentence out with "Back in the day" or "There was a time ..." You have to understand how hard it is to not say that when there's such a stark difference between then and now. I used to be the HR, operations, animal care, special events, fund development, and customer service manager. That was one very big and colorful hat! Now we have a fulltime person for each one of those positions. If that doesn't spell growth, I don't know what does. Maybe the budget going from \$40,000 to \$1.7 million speaks louder. There are so many milestones, but you know most of them already, and again, I only have this one page. Let's just say Virginia Slims has nothing on TCHS as far as coming a long way.

My deepest gratitude and admiration to our board members, staff, volunteers, donors, and supporters of every kind. (I just realized - I've reported to 40 different boards!) Over the decades we have created a compassionate environment for animals and the people who love them that extends far beyond our shelter walls. Please join me in being proud. It didn't just happen because of good ideas and intentions; it took

like-minded people to help get there.

I leave my role with a heart full of gratitude. I have complete confidence in Marit and the dedicated TCHS team to carry on making a positive impact on the lives of animals and people in our community and to take TCHS to even greater heights. Marit is guided by the same passion and dedication that has defined TCHS. She's very excited to be coming home, and I'm excited to welcome her with open arms.

During my nearly 40 years with TCHS, I have met SO many remarkable people I'm now honored to call friends. What a gift that is. That's the lovely thing about people who like animals - they tend to be the best kind of people.

The Scoop On ... Rabbits, Reptiles, Spiders, Oh My!

Although cats and dogs are typically the stars of the shelter, there are many other types of pets who come to Tri-County Humane Society in need of loving homes.

Our Small Animal Room tends to be a catch-all for any pet we take in who is not a cat or dog. This includes small mammals, reptiles, birds, and other unique pets. On rare occasion, we may even get in a tarantula! These critters may make up a smaller area in the shelter, but they will certainly still fill your heart just the same!

'Less work'? Not exactly

One misconception we sometimes hear is that a small animal pet such as a rabbit or guinea pig is "easier" or "less work" than a cat or dog. While they are not as demanding of our time and resources as cats or dogs may be, they still have specific housing, diet, medical, and so-

cial needs to be met. A great thing about adopting a unique pet species is the opportunity to learn about the biology of the animals and add to your knowledge of the natural world! The following is a brief list (not all-inclusive) of some of the small animals we rehome through TCHS. Keep in mind all animals should be given appropriate outlets to engage in the normal behaviors of their species.

Rabbits: Can live over 10 years with proper care; they are social with people once they are accustomed to them; they can be litter box-trained with the right steps and patience; do well with a large open enclosure or even a whole room to run around and exercise; if kept in a smaller cage/hutch they should get plenty of human social time and exercise outside of their cage.

Guinea pigs: Generally live 5-8 years; do best in same-sex pairs as

they are highly social with one another; have a wide range of entertaining vocals; tend to be easygoing.

Hamsters: Generally live 1-3 years; solitary animals and should not live with other hamsters; develop interesting individual personalities.

Gerbils: Live about 2-4 years; often do well in same-sex small groups; need lots of bedding/substrate in which to tunnel and burrow; active and curious.

Mice & rats: Generally live 1-4 years; very social with their own species and humans; intelligent critters who have been scientifically shown to display empathy; do best in same-sex pairs or small groups.

Snakes & lizards:

There are several varieties of snakes and lizards kept as pets, and each one has its own unique needs; reptiles are coldblooded so proper temperatures are important; they can live many years.

Turtles & tortoises: Tend to have quite long lifespans depend-



ing on the type; generally easygoing; some are aquatic and some are land-based; each type has unique needs; they are reptiles and need heat control as well.

Birds: Many different types of birds are kept as pets and each type has different needs; very intelligent animals and certain parrot-type birds can learn words: often kept in cages and should be given safe flight options as well; varying lifespans, many can be quite

TCHS is proud to announce that Dr. Deanna Quade is now the shelter's main veterinarian.

Dr. Quade takes over this contract position from Dr. Anne Lottie, who served as the shelter's vet for about five years. Dr. Quade has a long history with TCHS; before she joined our team as one of our contracted vets, she volunteered her services in our surgery suite.

While TCHS is not licensed to do vet care for the public, our shelter has mandated for more than a decade that all our dogs/puppies, cats/ kittens, and rabbits are spayed/neutered before their adoptions are complet-

ed. That means Dr. Quade is part of a very busy surgery team made up of staff and volunteer assistants.

Dr. Quade attended University of Minnesota College of Veterinary Medicine and graduated in 2006. She was in private practice for many years before eventually transitioning to shelter medicine.

When asked why she loves being part of #TeamTCHS, she replied: "Tri-County Humane Society does an amazing job ensuring all our animal friends are as comfortable as possible and are well cared for while in the shelter. I am impressed and amazed every day watching the staff handle the animals using

their Fear Free Handling training to make possible stressful situations as calm and comforting for the animals as possible. I am very thankful to work with such caring colleagues who go over and above to love all the animals in our care. Having the opportunity to help so many animals, and then see them find forever homes keeps my heart full!"

Vicki Davis, Thank You for (Almost) 40 Years of Service!

Tri-County Humane Society has changed a lot over the years. One constant: Executive Director Vicki Davis, who started her career with TCHS in December 1984. When Vicki started, she was the only full-time employee; she managed four part-time staff members and about 50 volunteers. (She also cleaned cages, did adoptions, did intakes, ordered supplies, did the medical work, wrote thank you notes—she did whatever needed to be done.)

Flash forward (almost) 40 years, and TCHS has about 30 employees, half of which are full-time. 200 volunteers every month in the shelter, and we adopt out about 300 to 400 animals every month. We've come far, and Vicki has been a major part of that journey.

We can't thank her enough for everything she has done for animals, for people, and for Central Minnesota.

"If you had to single out the one biggest change in animal welfare you've seen over your career, does one come to mind?"

"The animal welfare community/ organizations have become much more professional and are managed like a business. The other big change— the placement rate has improved significantly. That's the one big goal I was committed to: Stop having to euthanize healthy animals. When I started, the rule was I had to euthanize half of every black Lab mix litter, animals over 7 years old, and anything with medical issues, whether serious or not. I either had to guit or change it. I couldn't be more proud of where we are today."

"What's the first thing you're going to do in retirement?"

"A lot of nothing. And while I'm getting good at that, I expect to smile when I realize I don't have emails piling up."
